

Citing Sources Using Chicago Author-Date Format

The Chicago Manual of Style (CMS) was created by the University of Chicago Press. The CMS format is used primarily by those in the fine arts. This handout gives examples of the format used for the Notes which appear as either footnotes at the end of a page or endnotes at the end of your paper. Remember to number your references and list them in numeric order as they appear in your paper. For further assistance in writing internal citations or for creating footnotes, refer to one of the Chicago style manuals listed below.

Basic Bibliography Format

Author. Year. *Full Title of Book Including Subtitle*. Place of Publication:
Publisher's Name.

Example

Maimon, Elaine P. 1981. *Writing in the Arts and Sciences*. Boston: Little,
Brown.

In Text Example

(Maimon 1981, 74)

Electronic Book from a Database

Basic Bibliography Format

Author. Year. *Full Title of Book Including Subtitle*. Place of Publication:
Publisher's Name. URL.

Example

Carrier, David. 2003. *Writing about Visual Art*. New York: Allensworth.
<http://www.netlibrary.com>.

In Text Example

(Carrier 2003, 112)

Journal Article (Note: Format for newspaper articles differ. See the manuals listed above for guidance.)

Basic Bibliography Format

Author. Date. Title of article. *Journal Title* Volume: Pages.

Example

Mori, Kyoko. 2001. Staying true to the story. *Writer* 114: 26-29.

In Text Example

(Mori 2001, 28)

Journal Article from a Full-Text Database

Basic Bibliography Format

Author(s). Year. Title of article. *Journal Title* Volume, issue: pages. URL (accessed date).

Example

Murray, Aife. 1999. Miss Margaret's Emily Dickinson. *Signs* 24, no. 3: 697-703. <http://web7.infotrac.galegroup.com/itw/session/> (accessed May 3, 2000).

In Text Example- Note: Omit page number if only HTML version is available.

(Murray 1999, 699)

Web Site

Basic Bibliography Format

Author/Editor/Institution or Sponsoring Organization. Title of page used. *Title of Website*, URL of specific document (accessed date).

Example

University of Texas Cancer Center. Breast cancer. *Prevention research studies*. http://www.mdanderson.org/patients_public/prevention/ (accessed October 4, 2007).

In Text Citation

(University of Texas Cancer Center)
