4. From the library homepage, click on Databases and Article searching. Then, click on the “general” subject link. Open **Expanded Academic**. A typical record in Expanded Academic consists of a citation, a citation and abstract, or a citation and the full text of an article. Do a search that will find only **scholarly, full text articles** about **women** and **mass media**, but **exclude any references to films**. Remember to use Boolean operators in your search.



Advanced search

Click in the entry box and enter search expression

Key Word (ke)	drugs and advertising or marketing	AND
Key Word (ke)		AND
Subject (su)		Search

Select index then enter search term. Use AND OR NOT to connect the expression. Use JN or JN= to search for a journal by its title.
